



Timeline Calendar

A calendar built on a real, proportional timeline — for iPhone and Android.

The only calendar that lets you see and feel events on a true visual timeline, not just text or a grid of boxes.

What it is

Timeline Calendar shows your schedule on a continuous time axis — a real visual timeline. You get it in Day, Week, Month and List views, using the calendars you already have — nothing to move, nothing to re-enter.

Most calendar apps show your life as a grid of boxes. Or just text. Timeline Calendar shows it as a continuous, proportional time axis — a real, Gantt-style timeline — so you can see how your day, week, and month actually flow: durations, gaps, overlaps, and patterns, at a glance. It works on top of your existing calendars (Google, iCloud, Exchange, local), runs on both iPhone and Android, and it's free — with an optional one-time \$2.99 Pro, never a subscription.

Why it's different

The big calendar apps are grids (Google, Apple, Fantastical, Outlook). The closest "timeline" apps are really to-do lists pinned to a time rail — Apple-only, and subscription-based. Timeline Calendar is the only one that:

- Renders a true, proportional, scrollable timeline in every view — not just the day.
- Is cross-platform — iPhone and Android. Its closest peers are Apple-only.
- Is free, with an optional one-time \$2.99 Pro — never a subscription.
- Ships full Hebrew right-to-left support, plus five more languages.

Key features

- Four views — Day, Week, Month and List, all on one consistent time axis, with pinch-to-zoom.
- Works with your existing calendars (Google, iCloud, Exchange, local) — nothing to migrate.
- Color bars — mark events by calendar or by your own rules (Gym, Work, Family...), with a generator that builds a starter rule set from your events.
- Reminders & Tasks — a simple, built-in, syncing to-do layer with due dates, importance and alerts.
- Time zones — a fixed display zone, a second zone at a glance, and per-event zones (great for flights).
- Long-press the timeline to create an event at that exact day and time.
- Help right where you are — long-press the "?" on almost any screen for a short explanation of what you're looking at. No manual to hunt through, in all six languages.
- Live red "now" line, holiday and birthday bands, a home-screen widget, and subtle haptic feedback.

About the developer

Timeline Calendar began years ago as a tool for laying out the monthly schedules of air crews — long duties that crossed time zones and were far easier to see on a timeline than to read from a list or a regular calendar. It soon proved just as useful for recurring routines and everyday planning: a view that turns a set of events into a plan you can grasp at a glance. Travelers, students, pupils, shift workers, crew members — everyone. The idea was ahead of its time, and the project sat shelved for many years. After I retired, I decided to bring it back to life — Timeline Calendar returned to iOS a few months ago, and most recently to Android. It's still made by one person, Nir Tsook.

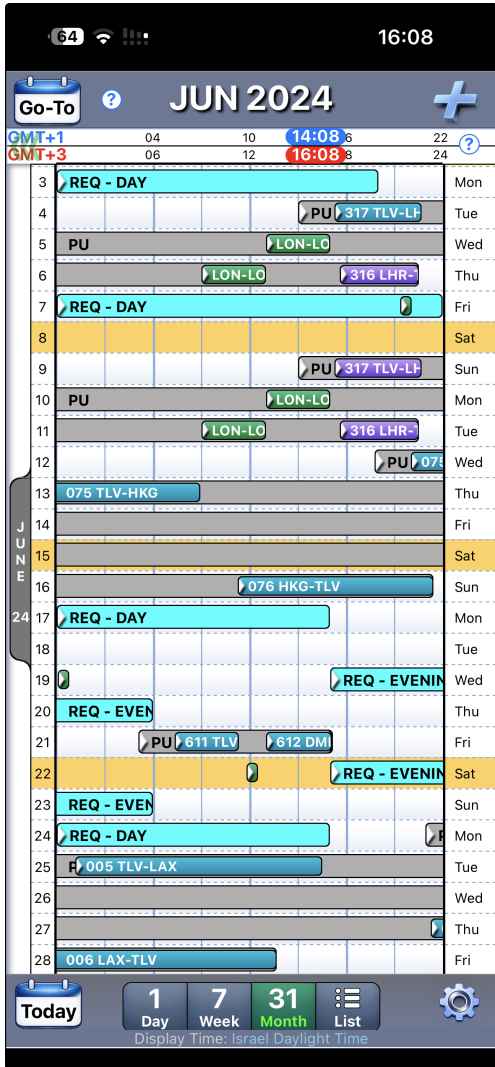

An air-crew roster, June. Flights out, the long stays abroad, flights home — one continuous shape on the left; truncated codes and times in brackets on the right.



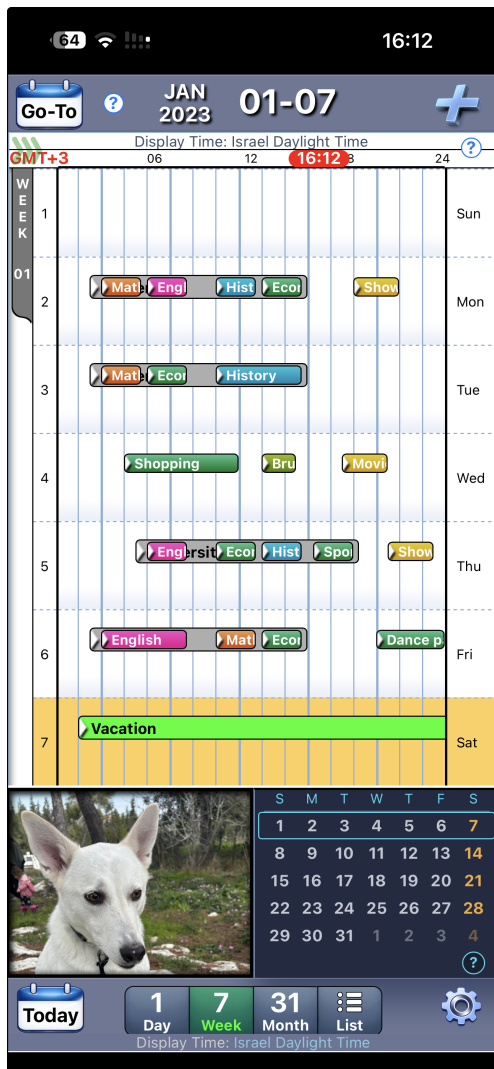

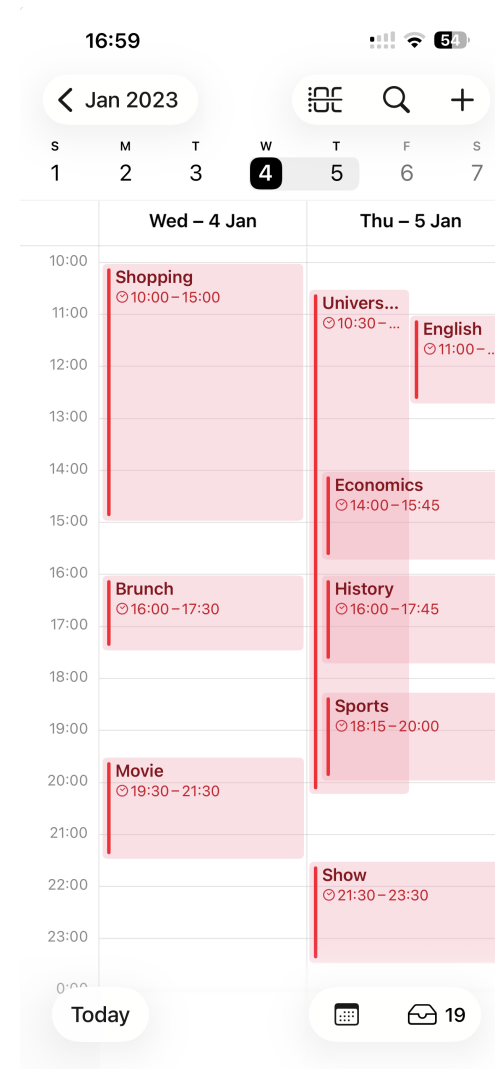
Apple Calendar

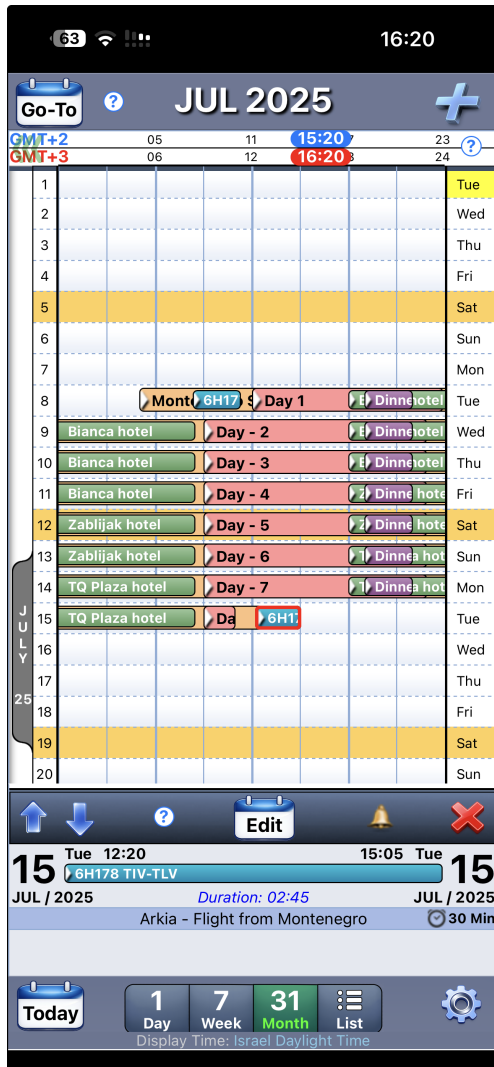
Timeline Calendar — a full week



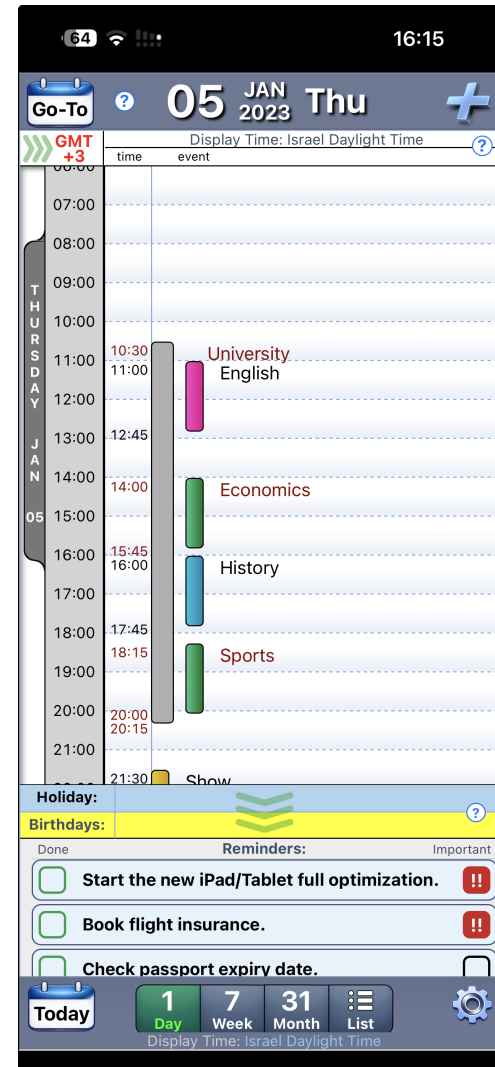
Apple Calendar — two days
